



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I-HELPTM

- → A framework for understanding the most common social and legal problems faced by vulnerable communities and how legal expertise and services can help mitigate their negative impact on health and health care.
- → A tool to help train and communicate the value of medical-legal partnership.
- → An acronym developed by NCMLP to describe these common health-related social and legal needs and includes <u>Income</u>, <u>Housing and Utilities</u>, <u>Education and Employment</u>, <u>Legal Status</u>, and <u>Personal and Family Stability</u>,
- → Adopted from the messaging guide "Framing Legal Care as Health Care."

How Legal Services	Impact of Legal Services
Can Help	on Health / Health Care
Appeal denials of food stamps, health insurance, cash benefits, and disability benefits	 Increasing someone's income means s/he makes fewer trade-offs between affording food and health care, including medications. Being able to afford enough healthy food helps people manage chronic diseases and helps children grow and develop.
Secure housing subsidies Improve substandard conditions Prevent evictions Protect against utility shut-off	 A stable, decent, affordable home helps a person avoid costly emergency room visits related to homelessness. Consistent housing, heat and electricity helps people follow their medical treatment plans.
Secure specialized education	 A quality education is the single greatest

- Common social and legal needs related to **personal and family stability**, such as restraining orders for Session 5: domestic violence, and adoption, custody, and guardianship for children.

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Remember Marcus?

- Prior: 7 years old, Little Rock, AR. Type 1 diabetes & asthma. Prior history of low blood glucose due to missing lunch at school. Family had school lunch debt and income challenges related to unsteady employment, leading to their losing their eligibility for the state's cash
 - assistance program. Debt collection activities had commenced.

What issues do you see? What would you do in response? What are the patient's desired outcomes?

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Marcus returns to the health center for a routine check up. He's now age 9 and in third grade. His family's school lunch debt issue has been resolved but his father mentions Marcus has been struggling at school. He recently took standardized tests and did not perform at the level his teachers thought he would based on their assessments of his academic skills. Dad also shares that emotions have flared recently when Marcus has become upset at missing a school field trip because there was no school nurse available to accompany him. He also lets slip that they are dealing with some disciplinary actions due to Marcus getting into fights with classmates during recess. Marcus appears quieter and sullen during the appointment than he has at prior appointments.

What issues do you see? What would you do in response? What are the patient's desired outcomes?

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- Marcus, age 9. Little Rock, AR. Type 1 diabetes and asthma.
- Poor performance on third grade standardized tests.
- Recent history of emotional outbursts and feeling upset at missing a school field trip due to lack of a school nurse.
- Recent history of getting into fights with classmates during recess, leading to disciplinary actions.
- Marcus appears quieter and more sullen.

What issues do you see? What would you do in response? What are the patient's desired outcomes?

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Andrea is a transgender woman being seen at the health center today for the first time. During intake she completes a SDOH questionnaire but seems reluctant to share too many specifics about her employment. After some discussion, she reveals that she is very worried about her job, specifically a fear that she will be fired or that her employer will remove her access to certain healthcare benefits. Andrea shares she has been dealing with a manager she does not report to directly who makes her uncomfortable by asking inappropriate questions and making derogatory comments about "real women." When asked why she thinks her benefits could be removed, she states that she's heard employers can tell their health plans what drugs to cover and her employer - a large corporation based in Texas - is generally conservative and known to be not LGBTQ friendly. Finally, Andrea is worried about her housing if she were to lose her job, as she lives in an apartment on a month to month basis with a verbal agreement with a landlord, but no written lease. She knows her landlord, also a member of the LGBTQ community, wants to sell the property and move out of Texas.

What issues do you see? What would you do in response? What are the patient's desired outcomes? Oday for the first time. During intake e too many specifics about her

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- Andrea, transgender woman, living in Texas.
- Identifies concerns with her employment, namely inappropriate questions and comments about "real women" from a manager.
- Fears losing access to her employer-sponsored healthcare benefits because her company is conservative and not LGBTQ friendly.
- Is also afraid of losing access to safe housing if she were to lose her job and her income, and if her landlord sells the property. She does not have a written lease agreement.

What issues do you see? What would you do in response? What are the patient's desired outcomes?


